As of Friday night, the weather for the Saturday fly out on February 27th was shaping up so we opted to fly to Florence (6S2) for a quick trip into town for donuts. The forecast called for 4000' ceilings in most of the valley but the coast from Newport to the north was showing 3000' broken but south towards Florence things looked promising with ceilings around 4500'.

Since we couldn't fly straight west and then south along the coast due ceilings and terrain, we planned head south to toward Eugene and cross west bound where the terrain was lower, and ceilings were forecast to be higher. 5ED, 382, and 74E launched toward Eugene and all was going as planned, but as we approached

Eugene the ceilings and visibility were socked in along the ridges between Eugene and Florence.

We had briefed the flight before departing and the

contingency was to divert to Creswell (77S) if the path towards Florence was impassable so that at least we could log a cross country. Since everyone was monitoring 123.45 the lead ship was able to call the

other aircraft and make the divert call to Creswell. We all jogged around the KEUG class delta airspace and completed the leg at 77S.

Our next flyout will be on Saturday, March 20th.

For everyone who likes being as precise as possible with weight and balance calculations, the chocks weigh 1lb.
