## N70574 is back!

N70574 is back from the shop with a completely new panel and other improvements.



Before...



...and after!

The entire panel was replaced, here's a summary of the most visible changes:

- G500 TXi (PFD/MFD)
- GTN 750 Xi and 650 Xi (GPS/COM/NAV)
- GFC 500 (two-axis autopilot)
- GI275 (standby PFD)

The new panel also has ADS/B, Flight Stream for wireless connections to tablets or other devices, and USB charging ports.

In addition to the avionics replacements, 70574 has new fuel sensors, new wiring and stereo headphone jacks, and the vacuum system has been completely removed. And there's now an engine monitoring system with individual cylinder head temperatures, and exhaust gas temperature.

Finally, 70574 now has a Big Red Button. It activates Garmin's Smart Glide, which uses the autopilot to direct the aircraft to the nearest suitable airport in the event of engine failure. Using Smart Glide is not recommended during checkrides, unless you want the examiner to 'upgrade' your simulated engine failure to include a simulated electrical failure...

Because of the extensive changes, all club members who want to fly the 182 will need a checkout with a club instructor, even if you were previously checked out in it.

All our club instructors can provide 182 training and checkouts, and you can now schedule time in 70574 as usual through Flight Circle. The new hourly rate is \$145.

The instructor cost will be \$25 per pilot and each pilot is responsible for paying for their aircraft time (estimated .5 hour). #### **PIREP: San Juan Islands**

The original fly out for August was to attend the annual Orcas Island fly in which is held every year during the first full weekend in August. Unfortunately, the fly -in was cancelled at the last minute so a few of us made an impromptu trip to the San Juan Islands over the Labor Day weekend. Our group consisted of eight, three in N515ED and two in N1636H. A little more detailed load planning was required for 5ED in order to get three occupants, camping gear, and fuel just right for the two-hour plus flight to KORS. As for 36H, it's mostly a two-passenger airplane plus baggage/fuel so it worked nicely for this trip.
