Upcoming airport security changes



The one question that many members ask is "Why does commercial air service affect general aviation, and why didn't it when Delta was here in 2007/2008?"

According to John Paskell (airport manager), Federal security regulations stipulate that scheduled passenger (or public charter) operations with aircraft having a seating configuration of 60 or fewer seats requires a security program that affects a much smaller area of the airport. Delta operated 50-passenger CRJ 200 aircraft in 2007/2008.

Avelo Airlines will be operating B-737-700/800 aircraft, with 61 or more passenger seats, which requires a full airport security program. A "full program" means everyone and everywhere within the airport's perimeter fence versus a "partial program" which was focused on the commercial terminal and the aircraft parking ramp in 2007/2008.

So, there are some significant security changes coming to the KSLE airfield that will affect every club member. The Board is working with Micah Aldridge, the Airport Credentialing Program Coordinator, to try to help the transition go smoothly for club members. Micah put together the following information for the newsletter to help club members understand what is coming.

 Currently the airport is issuing 'Secure area' ID badges to the rampers, servicers, public safety, and terminal staff. When those are complete (and the city of Salem gets the payment method online) they will begin further outreach to the GA/AOA (Air Operations Area) tenants and users.

- Commercial service begins 10/05; the new security plan and rules will go into place shortly before.
- TSA has given the airport several months to complete the issuance of ID media badges to the AOA group.
- Valley Flyers will have an 'Authorized Signatory' who will tell the airport the names of those associated with the club who the club authorizes to have a badge associated with Valley Flyers.
- Once the signatory is approved for ID media, then membership can submit applications.

We are anticipating the badging process will look like the following:

- The Signatory will distribute applications and confirm legitimate and authorized access on behalf of the club (the application will be both hard paper and a .pdf fillable form).
- The member will contact the airport credentialling office at 503-589-2060 or maldridge@cityofsalem.net and request an appointment date/time. The club is planning a group session at the November 14th Quarterly Membership Meeting. Outside of this session, members will need to contact the airport individually.
- The first appointment, the member will turn in their application, present the required identity verification documents listed on the I-9 (page 5 of application) and be provided with a short training/info packet. To help you prepare, a list of acceptable identity verification documents is included at the end of this newsletter.
- TSA typically takes a few days to complete a Security Threat Assessment (STA) on the applicant.

- The second appointment the member will sign an acknowledgement of the rules, have their photo taken, and be issued their SLE ID Media.
- Club members will be getting the AOA or 'Air Operations Area' ID media. It costs \$50 originally and \$35 dollars for renewal and is valid for 1 year.
- The airport's intention is to convert all electronic airfield gates to a two-factor authentication system. Meaning both the badge swipe and a PIN will be required to enter by 2024.
- Subjects with valid AOA ID Media that has an escort endorsement (E) can escort "as many persons as can be physically controlled" and up to two vehicles onto the airfield.
- TSA requires that the ID be worn outside the outer most garment, below the neck and above the waist. At all times in the AOA/SLE perimeter (ID Media will come with a card holder and lanyard).
- No one is to drive from the north to south hangars across the newly marked red commercial ramp. It is a 'secure area' and doing so would constitute a security violation. Exit the airfield and re-enter at an appropriate gate.

If you do not get your badge, you will not be able to access the airport to get to the club hangars and airplanes.

Please contact a Board member if there is a particular topic unrelated to airport security that you would like to have discussed at the Quarterly Membership Meeting. All members are encouraged to attend.



Airplane upgrades



We continue to make member-requested upgrades to each of the airplanes. Most of the equipment has been purchased, and now we are in the process of getting the installations completed. We have been working hard to coordinate the upgrades during regular maintenance so that we can minimize aircraft downtime. However, some of the upgrades will require a plane to be offline for multiple days.

Some of the upgrades include:

- Installing Rosen visors in all club aircraft. The Cessnas will have the optional 3rd axis modification. Please be careful when maneuvering the visors as they can break if they are not handled with care. You will be responsible for replacing the visor if you break it.
- Installing Inertia Reel 4 Point Shoulder Harness System in all of the Skyhawks.
- Upgrading the panel lighting in N12382, N5174E, and N1636H. The upgrades include a mixture of LED ring lights, post-lights, and new lighting controls depending on the aircraft. These are time-intensive upgrades as the panels and instruments must be disassembled.

- Installing Garmin GSB-15 USB Type-A and Type C charging ports in all airplanes except 70574 (which already has them).
- Upgrading all wing tip nav lights to LED.
- Installing Precise-Flow Air Vent Kits in each of the Cessnas. These vents should help reduce the cold air leaks in the winter.

Thank you in advance for your patience and understanding. We know that it will cause more inconvenience than desired since N12382 is still offline awaiting the return of its engine. The upgrades will be worth it!

- ID documents must be presented any time a badge is issued or updated
- At least one of the documents must contain a photo and one must be issued by a government authority
